Dear Mollye:—

I received your copy of the "Y"
Recorder today. Thanks a lot. I am
feeling great. I find it very hard
getting back into the Army routine
again after having a furlough but
I will get in stride in a few days.
The weather down here is wonder-
ful. The sun shines all day and

it is nice and warm. It is a big
change from the weather in Wil-
mington but personally I would
rather be in Wilmington. We had
a two and one-half hour wait in - -
so I walked through the town. You
can tell the Wilmington girls for
me that they have those - - -
peaches stopped a mile, even if
Scarlett O'Hara did come from
around here, or maybe I'm just
prejudiced.

When I returned to camp I found
we had a new company commander.
When he saw me he asked me if
I wanted a commission and I told
him, "no", I would work for a
straight salary. While I was on
furlough, Mrs. F. D. Roosevelt vi-
sited the camp. She was very dis-
appointed when she found out she
couldn't see me as her husband
told her to look me up personally.
After all, I voted for him.

Next time you write Artie, tell
him I am very sorry he has trouble
reading my letters. Tell him it is
good practice in case he ever gets
in the Intelligence Department.
That is the last place anybody
would look for him. In closing let
me thank you and all the rest of
the people in Wilmington, for
showing me such a swell time on
my furlough. I really had a swell
time. I hope that all of us boys
are home soon to stay for good.
