#### DEAR MOLLYE:-

Just a few lines to let you know I am o. k. and everything down here is fine. We just finished training period this week. We ended it with a long hike. We were out of water and my throat was so parched I thought my tonsils were in dry dock. Today, I had a good detail. I took care of the Colonel's car. His driver had a day off and all I had to do was watch the tires.

The first Sergeant paid me a compliment at reveille this morning. He told me I looked better today. He said "I should keep my eyes open all the time". We had a show at camp last week. I was M. C. and had them rolling in the aisles. Then some officer came and took the dice away. I didn't stop the show but I slowed it down a lot. We got a new Sergeant this week. What a guy! He's the kind of a guy that would marry Hedy La Marr for her money. He is very thin. He stood sideways one morning at roll call and they marked him absent. What a head he's got. I've seen better heads on nickle beers.

I was in charge of the squad last week. The Sgt. who usually is in charge went home on an emergency leave. His grandmother fell off the runway at Minsky's. That's all for now except if I ever meet up with those Japs or Nazis I'll fill them so full of lead that when they need a haircut they will just have to put their heads in a pencil sharpener.

Dear Mollye:-

Well, here I am, back on the job once more. Sure was nice to have seen you last week, even if it was only for a minute. Never saw a three day pass fly by so fast in all my life. But I guess after waiting for eight months to finally get home, a person can't expect 3 days to be like three weeks. The town sure does seem empty with almost all the boys away in the

service. Now that the bunch left last Thursday, it will seem a lot emptier. But the quicker we go and get it all over with, the sooner we can all return home to our families and our friends. It's funny how you expect a town to change in eight months, but the town still looks the same.

Must close now as I have to go on duty in a very few minutes. Regards to everyone around the "Y", and I hope to be home again real soon.

It's interesting to read the Y. M. H. A. news and I am glad to get the "Y" Recorder.

There was a Seder on the shore here last Monday night, and the Executive Officer, the Engineering Officer, an Ensign and I went over and it was really a very nice service. The other boy and I have been eating matzos for breakfast every day since and we are indoctrinating the rest of the junior officers. They like it.
