DEAR MOLLYE:—

Received your letter and it was a pleasure reading it. I was looking forward to getting one in the near future. My brother has been in the Marines since January 5th. The only thing he hates about it is the food otherwise its alright.

I am sorry I didn't go to see the "Mardi Gras", as they did not have it this year because of the war, the money went for other purposes to help win this war, I think that was a better idea, don't you. We moved to a different camp about nine miles away. It is Camp ———and we sleep in winterized tents, it has walls around it made of wood and we also have natural gas stoves to keep us warm, no more chopping wood, it's really a pleasure, but it's still not like home. I'm considering entering Officers Training School and learn a little something myself. I'll send you a picture as soon as I get one. Give everyone my regards and best of luck.

Dear Mollye:—

Congratulations to you on the presence of a new niece. You know the old saying . . . You made it number 1 on my letter parade. I received five letters today and I made it my business to get your's off first. In fact you are the only one that I am writing to tonight, because I am going to Services down in Denver.

They eliminated K. P. from the Air Corps. We have to furnish 40 men out of our outfit everyday. That sure is bad news. The Air Corp claim that it interferes with their studies so we have to suffer. One of the boys shot his head off this morning because he flunked out of the Flying Cadet School. What a nut.

Here is some good news, - the boys are getting furloughs out here. In fact they have started them already. We have ten days coming. I don't know when to put in for mine. Maybe in April, - if

I can get it then, but definitely I will be home, within the near future. Last Saturday night I went to a nurses dance at the General Hospital; before the night was over she asked me to her formal for March 28th. That's what I call working fast.

I heard of your column from my cousin, Neshie. I'll bet it sure feels good seeing your name in head- lines. Keep up the good work and "Keep 'em Mailing." Well, Mollye, my boy friend has finally gotten ready to go to "Shool". So I'll be saying so-long for now. In doing so remember me to the Sklut's, Sollod's, Ehrenfeld's in general the whole bunch.

I just received a copy of the Recorder from my mother. Much to my surprise I saw in it a letter to you, from my brother, so here's one from me. I have just finished my initial training period. What the army men get in thirteen weeks of training, we have to cram in our heads in four weeks. Since I am a Platoon leader, I have been Corporal of the guard several times when our platoon had guard duty. This is considered a very import- ant part of our training and I have received valuable training in this field.

My outfit is about to be shipped out of here, but I expect to remain as a D. I. But who knows, I'm liable to be shipped out with the rest of them. Until next time, give my regards to everyone.
