...ner, America would act in the fall of the British during the Munich conference broadcast from Prague. He stated that the Munich agreement meant war not peace. In 1939, immediately following the signing of the Nazi-Soviet pact which appalled the world in its apparent double-cross, that Russia and Germany were bitter enemies and would eventually fight a ferocious battle, last season he lectured throughout the United States on the subject "Russia and Germany Fight" Fortunate as it is that Mr. Hindus is coming at this particular moment, his lecture is a tribute to the fore-educational committee of the "Y" which recognized in its sessions the important role that must eventually play in our affairs. Mr. Hindus is a man of long experience and his lectures, his dramatic presentations, his scintillating personality make him one of the great figures ever to have appeared amongst a galaxy of brilliant authorities.
