## Edell, Miller And Topkis Will Vice-Chair The 1986 Jewish Federation Campaign

Stephen E. Herrmann, 1986 Jewish Federation of Delaware Campaign chairperson, recently announced that Dr. Steven L. Edell, Andrew L. Miller and William Topkis will vice-chair the 1986 Campaign.

Edell, who will oversee the Major Gifts Divisions, previously chaired the JFD Physician's Division for several years and is a member of the Federation's Board of Directors. He is a graduate of the Federation's Leadership Development Program, and has served for several years on both the medical and general boards of directors at the Milton and Hattie Kutz Home.

Edell is chairman of the department of radiology at Riverside Hospital on Lea Blvd. and is currently serving his second term as president of their medical staff. He teaches post graduate courses at Johns Hopkins Medical School in Baltimore and Thomas Jefferson University in Philadelphia. Edell has delivered over 50 scientific lectures and presentations and has published more than 35 major scientific articles. He is also immediate past president of the Greater Delaware Valley Ultrasound Society. A graduate of Rutgers University and the Philadelphia College of Osteopathic Medicine, he is board certified by the American Board of Radiology and the American Board of Nuclear Medicine. Before coming to Wilmington in 1978, Edell was assistant professor of radiology at the hospital of the University of Pennsylvania.

Andrew L. Miller, who will be responsible for Special Projects, has been involved with Federation campaigns for many years, and currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Jewish Federation. He is a past recipient of the Braunstein Leadership Award of the Jewish Federation of Delaware, and a past president of Jewish Family Service. A member of the American Jewish Committee, New Castle Moose Lodge and B'nai B'rith Lodges #470 and #3048, Miller has also served on the

Wilmington Senior Center Board of Directors since 1978.

Miller is president and chief executive officer of Miller's Furniture Industries, Inc., a six-store retail furniture chain, and president of Miller Realty, Inc., a family real estate investment company. He was chairman of the board of the Better Business Bureau of Delaware from 1979-1982, and still serves as a director on the board. He is also a director of Retail Store Services, Inc. in Baltimore and vice president and director of the Delaware Valley Home Furnishings Association, Retail Affairs. Miller has been a member of the board of directors at 1st Federal Savings and Loan since 1967, and is a past recipient of the Outstanding Retailer of the Year Award from the Home Furnishings Association of the Delaware Valley.

William M. Topkis who has also been appointed to serve as a vice-chairperson, will oversee the Professional Divisions, Super Sunday, the University of Delaware, and the Newark and Lower Delaware Divisions.

Topkis is a member of the Federation Board of Directors and is a trustee and member of the Jewish Community of Delaware Endowment Committee. He is a co-founder of the First Staters' Club of the United Way of Delaware.

Topkis, a third generation Wilmingtonian, is president of the Wilmington Financial Group. His organization frequently ranks among the top 10 Provident Mutual Life Insurance agencies in the nation, and he has been the recipient of numerous professional awards. Iris Vinokur and Harvey Rubinstein are in charge of the Centennial Celebration, and Esther Goldberg, 654-8442, is in charge of reservations. There will be a 15-piece orchestra, the Serenaders, to help make this a gala occasion. The entire community is invited to attend. A limited number of books will be available for purchase after the Ball.

## ON THE OTHER HAND N. Even-Or Moses' Audit Committee



For a very long time now it has been a requirement of the Securities and Exchange Commission that the books of every publicly held company be audited at least once a year by certified public accountants, to insure that financial information received by stockholders is fairly reported. Additionally, virtually all such companies now have audit committees of their boards of directors to oversee the work of the accountants. More recently, non-profit organizations involved in raising large sums of money, such as United Way and the Jewish Federation of Delaware, have also been audited by independent accountants, usually under the oversight of audit committees of their directors or trustees.

The precedent for such audits, where significant sums of money are involved, was set a very long time ago. How long ago? Something on the order of 33 centuries, give or take a few, depending on whose dating system you use. That is unless you come up with someone who called for an audit before Moses, *Moshe Rabbenu*.

The occasion for Moses' audit was the construction of the portable sanctuary ordered by God in the wilderness of Sinai: "And let them make Me a sanctuary that I may dwell among them." When the call went out for everyone "whose heart maketh him willing" to bring gold, silver, brass, fine linen, rare dyes, precious stones and other valuables, the outpouring was so great that Moses had to announce that no more donations could be accepted. "So the people were restrained from bringing, for the stuff they had was sufficient for all the work ... and too much." What a campaign! It should happen to the Federation!

So they began construction under the artistic direction, as they say these days, of Bezalel and Oholiav, and in the course of time the work was completed. Whether it was completed on schedule or set another precedent with the first construction delay or first picket line, we don't know. But when it was completed, the last pericope in the Book of Exodus begins with these words:

*"These are the accounts of the tabernacle, even the tabernacle of the testimony, as they were rendered according to the commandment of Moses, through the services of the Levites, by the hand of Ithamar, the son of Aaron, the priest."*

The sages of the *Midrash Rabbah* were convinced that this passage describes an audit. Referring to the talmudic tractate *Shekalim*, they noted that not less than two people must be assigned control over the finances of a city or community. Surely, they observed, Moses was solely in charge, but he solved the potential credibility problem by calling on others to audit the accounts. As specified in the above quotation from Exodus, the accounts were not rendered by Moses, but "through the services of the Levites, by the hand of Ithamar."

Can we really believe that anyone would have been suspicious of Moses? At least one commentator of the *Midrash* thought so, Rabbi Hama said:

*"What they used to remark was this: 'See how fat is the back of Moses' neck.' To which his friend would retort, 'What! Do you expect a man in charge of the construction of the Tabernacle not to be rich?' When Moses heard all this, he said, 'I vow, as you live, that as soon as the Tabernacle is completed, I will give you an account of everything.' And as soon as the work was finished he said to them, 'Come and I will give you a complete account.' That is why scripture says, THESE ARE THE ACCOUNTS OF THE TABERNACLE."*

The *Midrash* even teaches that God Himself helped Moses prepare the accounts for the audit. It says that while Moses was engaged in putting all the voluminous records together for audit, he forgot about 1775 shekels of silver which had been used for the hooks which held up the curtain around the outside of the Tabernacle. When, because of this, he couldn't balance the books, he worried that the Israelites would suspect him of taking the silver for himself. What did God do, according to the *Midrash*? "He opened the eyes of Moses so that he realized that it had been converted into hooks for the pillars."

What makes all this particularly significant is that God trusted Moses, even if some of the people didn't. In Numbers, God says of Moses that "he is trusted in all My house." That, apparently, wasn't good enough to satisfy everybody.

So, auditing is an ancient and honorable profession. Maybe not as old as another profession, but certainly more honorable. Next time the IRS calls you in for a tax audit, you might tell them about this. It might not help, but it wouldn't hurt.

## Yetta Chaiken Steps Down As Jewish Voice Chairperson

Yetta Chaiken, who has chaired the *Jewish Voice* editorial and newspaper committees since October 1983 recently completed a two year term and resigned from that post to pursue other interests according to Martin G. Mand, Jewish Federation of Delaware president.

Under Chaiken's guidance, the *Voice* has rapidly and steadily progressed toward its goal of becoming a true community newspaper.

During her tenure as chairperson, Chaiken continually brought new people into the process both to maintain the vitality of the two committees, and to ensure a broad scope of community representation.

With the aid of a professional demographer, Chaiken devised and oversaw the distribution of a *Jewish Voice* readership survey. One third of the individuals receiving surveys responded, representing an unusually high return rate. Respondents overwhelmingly liked the *Voice* and read it regularly, but suggestions, comments and criticism were carefully noted, and a number of these ideas have already been put into practice.

Based on survey results and other community input, the front page has been altered to reflect a new emphasis on local events and news analysis instead of fundraising. Two popular features have been added: "Naches Nook" and "Chuckles." The *Voice* has begun to draw from a reservoir of talent at the University of Delaware with exceptionally good results. Priscilla Siegel, a Newark art historian has added a new dimension to the *Voice* with her ongoing series of Jewish artists. Other Newark contributions have included an analysis of Israel's economic woes with a pro-

gnosis for the future, by economics professor Bertram Levin, and two articles on Sigmund Freud focusing on the dilemma Freud faced as a secular Jew, written by psychology professor Marvin Zuckerman.

This January, Chaiken took a major step toward alleviating the financial dependence of the *Jewish Voice* by hiring the newspaper's first full-time advertising manager.

Yetta Chaiken has exerted her unique ability to motivate people and foster constructive change, in literally dozens of major endeavors within the Jewish community, and her chairmanship of the *Jewish Voice* has been no exception.

## Edwin Golin Is Appointed New Jewish Voice Chairperson

Edwin Golin, president and owner of Gauge Corporation, a Wilmington marketing, public relations and communications firm, has been appointed by Jewish Federation President Martin G. Mand to serve as chairperson of the *Jewish Voice*.

Golin is no newcomer to the *Voice*. He was involved with the original negotiations in 1967 to purchase the

newspaper from the late Rabbi Krinsky. His guidance and involvement with the *Voice* continued into the 1980s and culminated in his establishment and chairmanship of a Jewish Voice Editorial Committee to establish editorial policy and oversee editorial content on an ongoing basis. Between 1981 and 1983, this committee met in his downtown office prior to the publication of each newspaper edition. One of his first things Golin did was to hire an artist to create a new front-page banner and reorganize the *Voice*. The current banner, a bold and dramatic rendering incorporating a stylized shofar into its design, is one of the artist's innovations.

Golin, a co-chairperson of the Governor's International Trade Council, has led six official government trade missions for the State of Delaware. He currently serves on the board of the Delaware Chamber of Commerce as well as the board and executive committee of the Delaware Art Museum. A former director of economic development for the State of Delaware, he currently serves as consultant of international marketing for Delaware.

Golin, as president of Gauge Corporation, is the publisher of *Delaware Lawyer, Incorporating In Delaware* and *Delaware Corporate Law Update*.

## Ethiopian Jewish Absorption Proceeding Smoothly; Many About To Gain Homes, Jobs

Chaim Aron, chairman of the Jewish Agency's Immigration and Absorption Department, said today that the absorption of Ethiopian Jews is entering its second stage, which will result in the new immigrants gaining their own apartments and jobs. He said the stage would take at least a year, probably more.

"I am pleased to report that the absorption process for Ethiopian Jews has been proceeding smoothly," said Aron, who spoke at a press briefing organized by the United Jewish Appeal and Israel Aliyah Center at UJA headquarters in New York.

"Within six months, 700 families will complete the process at absorption centers and move on into Israeli society, which has shown itself ready to welcome them." Aron said apartments and jobs outside absorption centers would be sought for more than 2,100 family heads "roughly within the next two years." He said that throughout this time, teenagers would continue to enter youth Aliyah villages, where 2,100 are already enrolled, and others would enter Israeli universities where 62 Ethiopian Jews recently enrolled.

Aron said that Ethiopian Jewish men are learning diamond cutting and polishing, high-technology and computer skills—marketable and well-paying skills in Israel and a far

cry from life in rural Ethiopia. He said the Jewish agency was committed to preparing Ethiopian Jews for tomorrow's jobs today and, in conjunction with the ministry of labor, to helping them find those jobs today.

He said the second stage depended on the new immigrant's understanding of Israeli society and ability to have a job and an apartment near that job. Israel has a housing shortage in the larger cities and other employment centers. Because of the high cost of gasoline and other factors, Israelis live near where they work. He said Ethiopian Jews want to be the ones to choose their own apartments and make other decisions. "They have been learning very well the ways of the Israelis," he laughed.

Aron said the agency was working to reconcile the tradition of Ethiopian women not working outside the home with the reality that most Israeli families depend on two incomes.

He noted that Ethiopian Jews arrived as individuals rather than in full family units and said one-parent families have special problems. "We are giving special attention to these families," Aron said, "and in stage two we will seek among other things to obtain housing for them near relatives and close friends."

In the end, he said, Ethiopian Jews will settle across Israel, based on where jobs are available.

Ethiopian Jews are registered in 30

# Top Jewish Leaders Meet Reagan On Soviet Jewry

Seven Jewish leaders from the United States, Israel and other countries stressed to President Reagan last month that while Jews want Reagan's summit conference with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev in November to be successful, that will depend on the Soviets living up to their agreements on human rights for Jews and others in the USSR.

"If the Soviet Union cannot be trusted to keep its word on a matter of humanity such as human rights on which their national security is not at stake, can we trust the Soviet Union to keep its word with respect to an arms agreement or matters affecting their national security?" Morris Abram, chairman of the National Conference on Soviet Jewry, said to reporters after the 15-minute White House meeting.

Abram said that Reagan assured the group of his "dedication" to human rights concerns and his "deep interest" in obtaining increased emigration and other rights for Jews. He told the group that "we can rest assured it will be a matter to be discussed" at the Geneva summit.

The visit was held as part of the meeting of the International Council of the World Conference on Soviet Jewry in which delegates from 25 countries participated at the B'nai B'rith international headquarters in Washington, D.C. Also meeting with Reagan were:

Leon Dulzin, chairman of the World Conference on Soviet Jewry; Gerald Kraft, president of B'nai B'rith International; Isi Leibler, president of the Board of Deputies of Australian Jews; Claude Kelman, chairman of the French Council for Soviet Jewry; Gregorio Faigon, president of the Argentine Jewish community; and Jerry Goodman, executive director of the NCSJ.

"If the Soviet Union seriously wants disarmament and detente the easiest way they can accomplish a climate in which to achieve this is by living up to their agreement (in the Helsinki Accords) on which the ink is not really dry," Abram declared.

Abram said that Jews are "delighted" that there will be a summit conference since Reagan will be able to raise these issues with Gorbachev. "We hope the Soviet Union will change its posture and attitude. We want peace, we want freedom, we

want detente." But Abram stressed that "we feel the question of credibility and trust is in Soviet hands and so far that record isn't good."

## November 19: Solidarity Day With Soviet Jewry

Dulzin announced, at a press conference following the two-day meeting of the World Conference, that Jews and non-Jews will be asked to participate in a "Day of Solidarity" in support of Soviet Jewry on November 19, the eve of the Reagan-Gorbachev summit. Dulzin said the day is to be an "expression of our voices as powerfully" as possible.

Kraft said that events would include prayers in synagogues, all-night vigils, moments of silence in legislatures and other government bodies, and other demonstrations. He said the Geneva summit "opens a window of opportunity the like of which may never come again."

The delegates pledged to Soviet Jews "that we shall never relent in our efforts until they are free," and stressed that "the USSR's treatment of its Jews will come to be the test of Soviet sincerity in all its international relations."

## Statement By Administration Official

At a dinner at the Capital-Hilton Hotel which concluded the International Council's two-day meeting, Michael Armacost, Undersecretary of State for Political Affairs, reiterated the position made continuously by the Jewish delegates.

Soviet violations of the "obligations" it undertook under the 1975 Helsinki Accords, "cannot but affect perceptions of Soviet willingness to abide by other accords and erode political confidence needed to make progress on a variety of issues," he said.

"It is our hope that Soviet authorities are coming to recognize that human rights will remain central to the United States-Soviet agenda," Armacost said.

"We are not asking Soviet authorities to do the impossible — but only to live up to their international obligations, and loosen the screws of repression tightened so cruelly in recent years. We watch the patterns of Soviet-Jewish emigration, as you do. We are prepared to respond as improvements occur."

## Reagan Names Breger To Post

Marshall Breger, president Reagan's special assistant for liaison with the Jewish community since Dec. 15, 1983, has been named by Reagan to be chairman of the Administrative Conference of the U.S., a job in which he will be responsible for Administration deregulation efforts.

The White House has indicated that a successor will not be named to Breger because there are plans to reorganize the Office of Liaison, headed by Linda Chavez, from one centered on relations with various groups to issues.

Interviewed at his office in the Old Executive Office Building by the

Jewish Telegraphic Agency Wednesday, Breger said he was "excited" about his new job which will give him the same rank as a Cabinet deputy secretary. He will be one of the highest ranking Jews in the Administration.

The Administrative Conference is the government advisory body on administrative law — the rules, hearings and programs of the federal agencies. The chairman also sits on several Cabinet councils and is head of an informal group called the Council of Independent Regulatory Agencies.

The 39-year-old Breger, an Orthodox Jew and former law professor, will continue as liaison until he is con-

of the agency's 70 absorption centers, generally with immigrants from other countries.

Aron said that despite the hardships of the Israeli economy, which has included high inflation, frequent shekel devaluations, sharp reductions in basic commodity subsidies and record unemployment of over 100,000, "in no instance have economic problems interfered with the absorption of Ethiopian Jews." In fact, he said, "no one has suggested we stop helping Ethiopian Jews because of economic considerations. It is in the conscience of the people of Israel that we are do-

ing a very important thing. And, the Ethiopian Jews know and appreciate it."

He said the effort to aid Ethiopian Jews "has brought us back to the first days of Zionism" — which stresses the freedom of Jews to live in Israel.

Noting that most funds for Ethiopian Jewish absorption have come from American Jews through United Jewish Appeal/Federation campaigns, Aron said, "it would have been almost impossible to perform everything we are doing with our Ethiopian brothers and sisters without the help of UJA" and the Jewish Federations.

## Who's To Blame

It is a fact that if there were no marriages, there would be no divorces. By the same token, there would be no deaths if there were no births. These relationships are both part of the scheme of life, and never have I heard anyone blame the process of birth for causing death.

However, when things turn out badly or even differently than we anticipated, we seem to have a need to label someone or something at fault. This is a rather simple and basic psychological principle. When experiencing disappointment, failure or loss, the internal impact can be somewhat diminished by venting anger on someone or something external.

Scapegoating has become a rather popular practice through the years. From individuals to whole peoples, as we well know, man has sought someone to blame, persecute, or even destroy.

In our practice at JFS, we usually deal with this phenomenon in regard to marital relationships and total families. When things go wrong in a marriage, in almost every case each partner knows without doubt that the other is at fault. When a divorce occurs, "no-fault" refers only to the legal

aspects. An experience this traumatic requires the need to vent anger at the other partner. How much better it would be for the couple, their children, family, and friends if each could feel "we both tried, it didn't work, let's go on from here."

In working with total families, we always look for and almost always find, one family member who is the scapegoat. When things go wrong, the other family members can relieve some of the pressure on themselves by blaming the scapegoat. Of course, this can have a devastating effect on the person blamed.

In counseling, we must often help the client work through these angry feelings of blame. Most people are aware that separated or divorced parents who are battling, put their children through even more anguish than the situation itself demands. We also find cases of problems in a second marriage that stem from the person still experiencing blame and bitterness toward their ex-spouse.

Some people feel that the alternative to blaming someone else would result in being consumed by guilt, which can also be devastating. The key issue in either case is the

Dear Rachel,

When my mother died eight years ago, she left money in her will for my brother, sister and me. Unfortunately, she divided the money very unequally, giving twice as much to my brother and me as to my sister (she had her reasons). My sister was furious, and demanded that we share the money equally with her. At the time, I needed the cash and refused to do so. We have not talked since that time.

I really regret that I didn't just give her what she asked. It wasn't worth the hatred and the hurt that has gone on between us. It wouldn't help to give her the money now, because she has more than enough now, too. What has changed is that my brother is seriously ill, and soon there will be no one else in this world who can share our memories of our parents and our childhood. I know that no one has told my sister about his illness. Even if she won't talk to him, I feel obliged to tell her what is happening before it is too late. I am already living with so, so many regrets. What can I say to her so she won't hang up the phone (which she has done before) as soon as I call? Thank you so much for your good advice.

Silent Sister

Dear Sister,

*Don't phone - write. And don't put a return address on the envelope either. Your first concern is to get her to stay put long enough to listen to what you have to say.*

*Your second concern is to avoid a rehashing of old grievances. Let her know you*

*understand how hurt she was and is. Let her know how much pain you are in because of the silence between you. Tell her why the silence is so difficult for you. Your brother's illness might be enough to break the wall of silence between you.*
