BLACK OUT RULES

In order that a complete record of those holding lockers may be available to the office, notice is hereby given to the "Y" membership that every number must be registered not later than November 1st. It is suggested to those who have not been down for some time that in the interest of sanitation and good health all equipment should be removed for a thorough cleaning. Unless a locker number is registered the contents will be removed after November 1st. In view of the growing shortage of rubber and other materials it is advisable that those who hold these lockers insure their equipment by listing the number with the office or removing the contents. Tennis shoes will be extremely difficult to replace.
