OCTOBER 7 AND DELAWARE FAMILIES

For many Delaware families, the events of October 7, 2023, were intensely personal. The Delaware Jewish community has many ties with the State of Israel. Many Delaware families have children and grandchildren there. While headlines and news reports have tried to come to grips with the events unfolding there, we wanted to remember the hopes and memories of those for whom the choice to make Aliyah and live in Israel was a cherished dream.

At a time when many college campuses witnessed protests, JHSD was able to offer a student at University of Delaware a moving experience—greater understanding and empathy. We are deeply grateful to the families who agreed to be interviewed by this year's Chaiken intern, Rebecca Volk, about the choices of their family members to live in Israel.

Howard and Judith Zucker have a grandson, Jacob, who became a paratrooper for the Israeli army. We hope for his continued safety thoughout his service.

Jordan and Sharon Rosen shared that, despite the present dangers in Israel, their children and grandchildren are, fortunately, safe despite the present dangers.

JHSD and the entire Delaware Jewish community hopes they will remain safe and soon know peace.

Rebecca also interviewed Rabbi David Geffen on June 16, 2024. Rabbi Geffen, from his home in Jerusalem, spoke of his early visits to Israel and the experiences that moved him and his family to make Aliyah in the 1970s.

As Rebecca expressed during her presentation at our Annual Meeting on May 3, "...despite various perspectives and beliefs in Zionism, the current dangers, the polarizing tension, and the constant anxiety concerning family safety, there is still strong support and passion for the Jewish state." This summer, thanks to the Jewish Historical Society of Delaware and the Albert Lepage Center for History in the Public Interest at Villanova University, I had the opportunity to explore the "Dear Mollye" collection. The collection features the letters written by nearly 350 Jewish service members to Mollye Sklut, secretary of the Wilmington YM-YWCA, as a result of correspondence she maintained with them throughout World War II.

Handling the envelopes and v-mails and exploring the messages contained within is akin to a journey into the life of another. The letters contain stories of major world events and mundane daily occurrences. They discuss grueling training, the horror of the front lines, and concern for loved ones at home. They share moments of deep reflection on the state of the world and the human condition, as well as lighthearted moments filled with pranks, athletic competitions, and the funof USO dances. They express the warm feelings experienced when welcomed into the homes of lewish families far from home and dissolution and anger at the death and destruction caused by virulent antisemitism. They brim with the joy, heartbreak, confusion, sacrifice, and love that define the human experience. The letters provide a window into the past, allowing us to peer beyond mere abstract dates, places, and events and into the personal experiences of these extraordinary men and women. Their writings make World War II, from the perspective of the Jewish population of Wilmington, Delaware, available to the world.

As we approach the 80th anniversary of the war's conclusion, it is more crucial than ever that these stories are heard, seen, and felt with the heart. That is the ultimate aim of the essential research the JHSD and the team of volunteers conduct. By exploring these letters, mining primary sources for additional facts and details, and connecting with friends and loved ones, we seek to create a complete personal profile for every service member included in this collection and many more who served but who did not correspond with Mollye or whose letters did not survive. These profiles are currently being created on the JHSD Wiki page and will become a repository of memory for families and a valuable resource for historians of the war, Wilmington, and Jewish life.

In the coming months, we will host volunteer work sessions at the Coxe House, hold an interactive discussion on November 10th in honor of Veterans' Day, and prepare a grant application to create a World War II curriculum for high school students and adult learners based on the Society's World War II collections.

Eighty years after WWII, it is time to bring to life the Jewish GIs whose correspondence with Mollye Sklut was memorialized in the "Dear Mollye" letters.

In a letter written to Mollye on November 4, 1944, Jack Coonin, my father, told Mollye that those who were killed in action deserved more than just a name on a wall plaque. The same can be said for those who did return. They walked the same streets we walk, belonged to the same synagogues, grew families, built businesses, fostered social connections, and built this community.

The Wiki database that is being built by JHSD about these heroes will include any information that can be ascertained about them. Our research will be ongoing. The information we learn is enlightening, thought-provoking, and at times humorous. The database, once operational, will be available for all to access.

ARCHIVIST'S REPORT

The study of history is an undertaking one pursues because it helps us to make sense of the world, to understand our past and the people who built the institutions that shape our lives. It's not, usually, a course of study that leads to a wide range of career opportunities. Although the diversity of options is actually quite surprising. Everything has history. So historians might cover anything from the history of aerospace to the history of zoology.

I have been fortunate to spend much of my career with the history of the Delaware Jewish community, which is also quite diverse. There's a good measure of business history—the Jewish community has a great entrepreneurial spark, lots of family history, military history, some political history, history of science, social history, and more.

The JHSD collections include materials about the institutions and congregations and the people who built them—stories of courage, compassion, vision, and perseverance. Many of the personal papers offer examples of dedication and imagination and include family photos and sometimes home movies.

But there's something special about the moments when people talk or write about their own lives and attempt to come to terms with the world in which they live. The "Dear Mollye" letters and our oral history collection offer such thoughtful reflections. Making these collections more accessible to visitors offers new possibilities.

It has been a pleasure to work with Allen Rosso this summer and benefit from his knowledge and insight as he explores the "Dear Mollye" letters. And it was equally rewarding to welcome Alex May back from a project archivist position at Winterthur. Alex first came to JHSD as a volunteer in fall 2021 and was hired in July 2022 as a project archivist to process records accessioned from the JCC. He has resumed that work with allocation funding from the Jewish Federation of Delaware.

Indeed, JHSD has a great A-team with Allen and Alex each working on significant collections documenting the 20th century Delaware Jewish community and Rebecca Volk collecting oral histories today. They are not TV superheroes or the starting lineup of a sports team, but dedicated, thoughtful historians bringing meaning, order, and understanding to our past. That sure seems like a superpower to me. Thank you, Allen, Alex, and Rebecca. You are heroes!

WORLD WAR II: VOICES OF SERVICE

In February 2025, JHSD and the Delaware Historical Society (DHS) will jointly host *World War II: Voices of Service*, a traveling exhibition from the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History (GLI).

World War II: Voices of Service explores major events of the war through the photographs, letters, and oral histories of everyday Americans. From the attack on Pearl Harbor through the GI Bill, this traveling exhibition provides an overview of the important events on the battlefield and the home front.

The exhibition commemorates WWII veterans and service members through the discovery and sharing of their stories, reminding viewers that it was individual Americans from all walks of life whose service and sacrifice led to Allied victory.

The Delaware cultural heritage collections at the Delaware Historical Society and Jane and Littleton Mitchell Center for African American Heritage, JHSD, and the Hockessin Colored School #107C offer many remarkable resources for exploring the issues and material in *World War II: Voices of Service* from a local perspective, using the stories of Delawareans during the war. The exhibit will be displayed at the Delaware Historical Society from February 3–28, 2025, and special programming will highlight Delaware collections of wartime correspondence from our collections: DHS's "*An American Family In World War II: The Minker Family Letters*," JHSD's "*Dear Mollye*" collection, and stories of service from the African American community.
