World War II: Voices of Service — February 5th at DHS. See article on P. 5.


Congregation Beth Sholom in Dover — February 23rd at DHS. See article on p. 4.

JHSD ANNUAL MEETING APRIL 6

Dr. Roger Horowitz will explore the role of DuPont company CEO Irving Shapiro in spearheading efforts in the mid-1970s to cripple the Arab League boycott of Israel. His position as chair of the Business Roundtable and relationships with prominent business executives and leaders of America's Jewish community allowed him to forge a consensus behind legislation passed by Congress in 1977 that fatally damaged the boycott.

Roger Horowitz is Director of the Center for the History of Business, Technology, and Society at the Hagley Museum and Library and Professor of History at the University of Delaware. His recent book Kosher USA: How Coke became kosher and other tales of modern food received the National Jewish Book Award in American Jewish Studies, the Dorothy Rosenberg award on the lewish Diaspora from the American Historical Association, and was named an Outstanding Academic Book by Choice magazine. He also is the treasurer of the Business History Conference, a trustee of the lewish Historical Society of Delaware, and a member of the executive council of the American Jewish Historical Society.

JHSD's Annual Meeting will be held at the Siegel Jewish Community Center on Sunday, April 6, 2025, at 2 PM. A brief business meeting will precede Dr. Horowitz's presentation, and we will conclude with refreshments and socializing.

As part of our 50th anniversary activities, the JHSD has mounted an exhibit of images and artifacts documenting the history of recreation within the Jewish community. You can see the exhibit in the Siegel JCC ArtSpace during March and April. We celebrated the exhibit with a reception in the ArtSpace on Sunday, March 16, 2025.



Jewish Living Delaware has published—in print and online —a written history beginning in 1902 with the incorporation of the Young Men's Hebrew Association (Y) and ending in 1970 with opening of the Siegel Jewish Community Center building in 1970. A second article bringing the history up to date will be published later in the year.

For both the exhibit and the articles, the term recreation has been used broadly to cover socializing, sports, the arts, camping, and informal education. The locations described include the Y, the Adas Kodesch Center, the campsite at the Sellers Estate, the Brandywine Country Club, and the J.

One of the interesting items learned during preparation of the exhibit and article is how the name of the YMHA became the JCC. In June 1922, the Jewish Community Center (JCC) was established as an organization, and theoretically the YMHA became extinct. Various documents

and newspaper articles continued to call the organization the YMHA. With the exception of the Adas Kodesch Center years, the YMHA (YM-YWHA) was identified as the Y or the Center until the new building opened, even though the name was legally changed to the Jewish Community Center in 1954.

DO MORE 24 DELAWARE

JHSD participated in the 2025 Do More 24 Campaign organized by Spur Impact. Do More 24 Delaware is a 24 hour day of giving designed to help non profits raise more money and engage new donors. This year's campaign ran from March 6, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. to March 7, 2025 at 6:00 p.m. JHSD has participated in this fund-raising program since 2021 and raised \$1,026 this year, nearly matching the \$1,118 raised in 2024. The final totals will be released soon.

The organizers encourage grant makers and business sponsors to contribute to matching funds and other incentives to help make the contributions of donors have even greater impact for the non-profit's mission.

On Saturday, March 15, the Jewish Historical Society of Delaware and the Hockessin Colored School #107C hosted a special screening of the Tyler Perry film *The Six Triple Eight* (2024).



James 'Sonny' Knott, a former student at 107C, welcomed attendees to the event.

The screening was held at the restored school, which was built in 1920 as a one-room schoolhouse to serve black children, who were not permitted to attend school with white children. It played a monumental role in the 1954 U.S. Supreme Court ruling, Brown v. Board of Education, which desegregated schools nationwide. In 2020, Hockessin 107C reopened as a National Park and Center for Diversity, Inclusion, and Social Equity. The venue provided the perfect backdrop for a film highlighting the racism and sexism of the segregated United States military during World War II.

We were joined by Kevin Hymel, who provided anecdotes from his conversations with WAC Corporal Lena Derriecott Bell King, who served the 6888 Battalion, and his work with Tyler Perry

on creating the film and answered questions from the audience. Hymel is a historian at Arlington National Cemetery who has written extensively for *WWII Magazine* and is the author of three books on General George S. Patton. His article "Fighting a Two-Front War," based on oral history interviews

he conducted with Ms. Derriecott King, brought the story of the Six Triple Eight to Perry's attention and led to Hymel serving as a technical advisor on the film.

The JHSD looks forward to further collaborations with the Hockessin Colored School 107C and other organizations across the state of Delaware as we continue to share stories that underscore the importance of history's interconnectivity and enhance our understanding of the ways our past impacts our present and shapes our future.

Our Dover guests filled the Kristol Reading Room at the JHSD for a brief presentation by Allen Rosso, who has curated the exhibit display and the online web exhibit. JHSD is grateful for the special Sunday opening of the Delaware History Museum to accommodate members of the Jewish community from all parts of Delaware. Congregation Beth Sholom's travel expenses were covered by a grant from the Jewish Federation of Delaware.

We look forward to upcoming visits to Seaside Jewish Community on June 29 and Beth Sholom on October 19, 2025.

JHSD and the Delaware Historical Society (DHS) co-hosted World War II: Voices of Service, a traveling exhibition from the Gilder Lehrman Institute of American History (GLI) in February 2025.

World War II: Voices of Service explores major events of the war through the photographs, letters, and oral histories of everyday Americans. From the attack on Pearl Harbor through the GI Bill, the traveling exhibition provides an overview of the important events on the battlefield and the home front.

The Delaware Historical Society and Jane and Littleton Mitchell Center for African American Heritage, JHSD, and Delaware's World War II Fallen created additional exhibit panels and shared artifacts, oral histories, and documentary films from our collections to explore the issues addressed in the GLI World War II: Voices of Service from a local perspective, using the stories of Jewish American and African-American Delawareans during the war. The exhibit was displayed at the Delaware Historical Society's Old Town Hall from February 3–28, 2025.

The JHSD exhibit drew from our treasured the "Dear Mollye" Collection to view the war on an intimate scale through the letters and artifacts of seven service members who corresponded with Mollye Sklut; Artie Blatman, Lou Brown, Jack Coonin, Sid Feldman, Sam Gellar, Joe Lichtenbaum, and Ralph Tomasas. Special thanks is extended to the families of Lou Brown and Ralph Tomasas who donated and loaned personal items for use in the exhibit.

A web-exhibit with expanded material is available at https://jhsdelaware.org/voices-of-service/cover/. From the web-exhibit visitors will find "Mollye's Album" with links to a growing collection of biographical material and photographs about Delaware's Jewish WWII service members. This information provides a great resource for genealogists and family historians. Contact JHSD to become a volunteer and help us provide the stories for all Jewish veterans. Visitors are also encouraged to explore the *Delaware's World War II Fallen* website created by Lowell Silverman. Lowell has conducted extensive

research and created in-depth profiles on 21% of the 754 Delawareans who lost their lives in combat.

This exhibit would not have been possible without the dedicated efforts of Allen Rosso, a graduate student from Villanova University. Allen came to JHSD as a summer intern in 2024 through the Lepage Center for History in the Public Interest. His insight and appreciation of our "Dear Mollye" collection has been an inspiration.

JHSD has applied to the American WWII Heritage Cities Grant Program administered by The National WWII Museum for support to help digitize the "Dear Mollye" Collection. Over 14,000 images would be scanned, cataloged, and indexed offering a remarkable resource for understanding the WWII Home Front heritage of Delaware's Jewish community.

Following the progress of JHSD's interns is so rewarding. Take a look at the accomplishments of our interns.


